



IILP Review: The State of Diversity and Inclusion in the Legal Profession

AUTHORS' GUIDELINES

IILP Review: The State of Diversity and Inclusion in the Legal Profession (“The IILP Review”) is an annual review that collects, compiles, examines and discusses the most cutting edge efforts to create a more diverse and inclusive legal profession. A signature facet of the Review will be 1) three or more in-depth analyses about some new or cutting edge facet of diversity and inclusion in the legal profession; and 2) thought leadership pieces examining and highlighting current issues of particular interest to specific groups of lawyers who are diverse.

The IILP Review is seeking both Feature Articles that make the most current scholarship about diversity and inclusion in the legal profession easily accessible to the busy practicing lawyer or sitting judge and Thought Leadership Articles that explore and educate about different facets of diversity. These articles are not intended to be as academic as law review articles (citations and notes should be kept to a minimum) nor as general as articles that might be published in a bar association magazine. Rather, authors of these articles should strive to write pieces that are substantively informative and thought-provoking but intended for an audience of lawyers, judges and legal profession diversity professionals for whom scholarship is something for which they lack adequate time.

Feature Articles should include an executive summary of not more than one-page. Articles should be approximately 10-25 pages in length. Thought Leadership Articles should be 5-10 pages in length.

Submissions for publication in the IILP Review should not have been previously published although they may be based upon articles written for law reviews or academic journals. Authors will be asked to assign the IILP Review non-exclusive rights to the article. Each author will also be expected to provide a brief biography of no more than 250 words.

To submit an article for publication, please provide a 1-2 page proposal explaining the topic, the points you plan to make, any particularly novel insights or thought-provoking aspects to the article, and any new information you will be disclosing that is not yet widely known within the legal profession.
